






## PAPUDUK and the MAGICAL SEEDLING







Mama dear, have you planted these seedlings.


And they are seedlings of what?




After Papuduk's mother said that she did not plant the seedlings she gave a riddling answer.
























nature. That is, a fact.


Alright, is this transformation of a tiny acorn to a gigantic tree only valid for oaks? Of course not.




Unfortunately many people throw the kernels of the fruits and

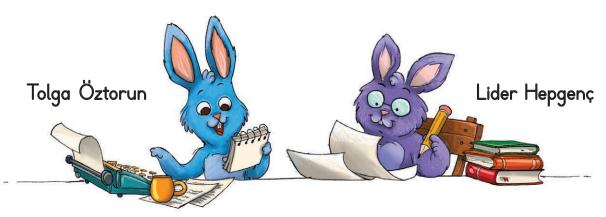
