
So many of the straws of all colours that they used at each meal! And there were also fruit juice boxes and a carrot pizza in the garbage.

It felt that it should do something about these wastes.







to tell it that they were already using cloth bags.

Or stop using straws for good."







If there are no waste bins in your



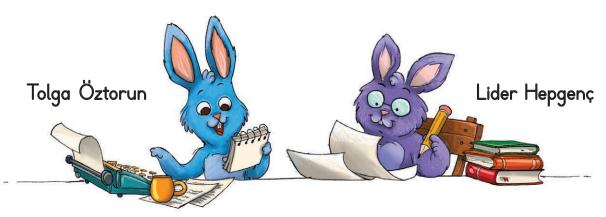

Alright then, what if there was a beverage box that left no need to straw? I think that you can design such a beverage box. What about sharing your design with the people in the universe?
